All Enrolments for 2024



Please be advised that the school is now taking enrolments for 2024. If you have a child already attending KRPS and have a child starting school next year, please complete and submit an enrolment form as soon as possible. We need to submit our projected school enrolments for 2024, in Week 3 next term. All school staffing (teaching, non-teaching and specialist teachers), buildings and resources are based on enrolment numbers submitted in August this year. Please note that when submitting your child's enrolment form, it is necessary to bring your child's Birth Certificate or identity documents, copies of family law or other relevant court orders, your child's immunisation history statement and proof of residence. You are able to complete the enrolment online and then bring the original documents into school at the beginning of the term. 
MESSAGE FROM THE DEPUTY PRINCIPAL

Regular School Attendance

Time away from school adds up quickly. If a student has an attendance rate of 90%, then this equates to one full day absent a fortnight. Over a year this equates to 20 days absent from school, this is 4 weeks lost learning time.

We understand that in some cases illness and family emergencies happen. It is our aim as a school and system that our students are attending 90% or more of the time. Each fortnight, we will provide an update on student attendance so as a community we can aim high, with a focus on attendance and keeping on track.

As of this term, 72% (505) of our students are attending 90% or more of the time. Let's see if we can increase this percentage of students in Term 3. Please keep explaining absences and helping children arrive on time. "We are learners when we get to school on time!"




Positive Behaviour for Learning at KRPS

<u>PUPIL Program Session 4- High Potential Gifted Education:</u> Challenging and Enriching Your Child's Learning

Last Thursday night we concluded our Term 3 suite of learning in our PUPIL Program. It was another wonderful turn-out, with our attendees having the opportunity to engage in an extended Q&A at the conclusion of the evening. The session touched on the DoE High Potential Gifted Education Policy, identified the domains of potential, and defined the continuum of potential. We also discussed the professional learning KRPS staff are engaged in and outlined opportunities for our high potential/gifted students in the various domains that are offered at Kellyville Ridge. Our parents also had the chance to offer some feedback about these programs and the accessibility of this across the school K-6.



Key Takeaways from Session 4- Domains of potential and advocating for your child

In Session 4 we highlighted the importance of recognising the different domains of potential. It is important to note that

students can display potential across the intellectual, creative, social-emotional and physical domains, and these are not mutually exclusive, but rather highly influenced by each other. During the session we highlighted the essential role parents have in assisting teachers to identify their child's potential, and we provided a range of resources and advice to aid parents in supporting their child and maximise their unique potential.

NAPLAN 2023 - UPDATE

NAPLAN 2023- UPDATE

Our Year 3 and Year 5 parents are eagerly anticipating the reporting of NAPLAN 2023 results. A NAPLAN individual student report will be provided by our school once they have been forwarded to us by the Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA). These reports are expected to arrive at school for distribution to families early in Term 3 and will be sent home with your child.

From 2023, NAPLAN results are reported against *new proficiency standards*, with student achievement shown against *4 levels of proficiency*. There is a standard for each assessment area at each year level. This replaces the previous numerical NAPLAN bands and national minimum standards.

How is my child's performance reported?

Individual student performance is shown on a national achievement scale for each assessment. This scale indicates whether the student is meeting expectations for the literacy and numeracy skills needed to participate fully in that year level.

NAPLAN Scales and Proficiency Standards

Education ministers agreed that NAPLAN test results would be reported using proficiency standards beginning in 2023. Together with the move to an earlier NAPLAN in March, these changes meet an initiative of the 2019 National School Reform Agreement. The proficiency standards are reported on reset NAPLAN measurement scales that make better use of the online adaptive tests.

Scales

NAPLAN results are reported using measurement scales for each of the assessment areas of numeracy, reading, writing, spelling, and grammar and punctuation (these last 2 together called conventions of language). There are 5 scales in all.

Proficiency Standards

The NAPLAN proficiency standards include 4 proficiency levels for each assessment area at each year level:

- Exceeding: the student's result exceeds expectations at the time of testing.
- Strong: the student's result meets challenging but reasonable expectations at the time of testing.
- Developing: the student's result indicates that they are working towards expectations at the time of testing.
- Needs additional support: the student's result indicates that they are not achieving the learning outcomes expected at the time of testing. They are likely to need additional support to progress satisfactorily.

Each of the standards represents increasingly challenging skills and understandings as students move through the years of schooling.

More detailed information to assist parents in understanding and interpreting NAPLAN results will be provided when reports are available to parents.
