MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL



Welcome back to Term 3 KRPS

Welcome back to Term 3 and NAIDOC Week! Can you believe that it is the end of July already?! We were excited to welcome your children back last week after engaging in a staff development day on Monday. Our staff were busily preparing for this term's learning. Last week, we celebrated NAIDOC Week, and are looking forward to hosting several more activities throughout the term where parents and community can be part of the learning journey with us. Last week, KRPS celebrated NAIDOC Week. The year's theme was 'For our Elders' and we joined with our local Aboriginal community to celebrate the history, culture and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and to learn more about the Dharug people and their language. In conjunction with fabulous in-class activities, our students were fortunate to be part of a cultural incursion at the school on Wednesday. Our whole community was welcomed by Mrs M. Stubbings and were lucky enough to have her teach some of the Dharug culture and language, The Wandana group teaching the symbols of Aboriginal artists as well as to the tools and weaponry used.

The students were taught Aboriginal dance from other mobs by members of the Kellyville Ridge community, Mrs Heritage and Tahunna. Yarns with Aboriginal stories, planning gardens with Aboriginal bush tucker, telling stories pictorially by utilising Aboriginal symbols, playing Aboriginal games and understanding face painting were all parts of our NAIDOC immersion experience paying homage to the Dharug elders.

I would like to thank Ms Gammone, Ms Ross, Mrs Zastavnikovic and their team for their organisation and co-ordination of our NAIDOC week, where we could show great honour and respect and acknowledge the invaluable contributions our Dharug elders have made and continue to make in shaping our lives and our collective future.

NAPLAN

Students in Years 3 and 5 sat the NAPLAN assessments in March. We have now received the individual student reports and additional student reports. These will be distributed to students this week.

The reports look different this year with proficiency levels rather than bands. Information on interpreting the reports can be found on this clip and is also supplied in the letter that will be sent home.

In September, the school will receive further data around comparisons with similar schools and the state and once this data is released, I will share it with the community.

School Finance and Permission Notes



We are excited to announce our school will be transitioning to an upgraded School Bytes finance system on 1 August 2023!

All families **MUST** register to have access to all permission notes and payment portal by 1 August 2023.

What is the School Bytes portal?

The School Bytes portal provides flexibility for you to conveniently:

- Make school payments online (including paying for multiple siblings at once)
- Use a family credit to pay for an activity or school contributions
- Download a receipt for payments made
- · View all historical payments in one place
- Complete and submit digital permission notes (All permission notes will be submitted here)
- View the status of all permission notes
- Request a refund if required

This can be done where you want at any time: day or night.

Through the portal, you will easily be able to download a receipt once a payment has been made and have access to view all historical payments when needed. Online payments are processed in real-time and can be viewed by school staff immediately. While our preference is for payments to be made via the portal, we will still accept payment via cash, and EFTPOS in the front office.

In preparation for the transition to a simplified finance system for both you and the school, we will be required to implement a short payment lockout period where we will not be able to receive any payments.

- Moving forward, when making a payment online, you will be redirected to a Service NSW page to complete an online payment. This is the new payment platform for online as directed by the NSW Department of Education.
- Payments made online will display as <u>OSCHOOLSONLINE 0000 PARRAMATTA AUS</u> on your bank statements moving forward.

School Spectacular

Planning for 2024



Next week I have to submit the anticipated numbers for KRPS for 2024. For families with children in years K-5 there is nothing you need to do if you intend on being at KRPS next year. Where I do need your assistance is, if you know any families in our catchment area that are planning to enrol for 2024 but as yet have not done so, please encourage them to do so as a matter of urgency. Submitting the numbers is the first step in planning for next year and these numbers impact the school's teaching and overall staff allocation and funding, so it is important to try and get an accurate indication where possible. Obviously, things may change between now and the beginning of next year. Additionally, if you are planning to leave the school at the end of the year (this does not include the current year 6 students) please send the school an email with that information to assist with our planning. Thank you for your assistance in ensuring our school can start the year resourced effectively.

Enrolments open



Please be advised that the school is now taking enrolments for the remainder of 2023 and 2024. If have a child already attending KRPS and have a child starting school next year, please complete and submit an enrolment form as soon as possible. All school staffing (teaching, non-teaching and specialist teachers), buildings and resources are based on enrolment numbers submitted in August this year. Please note that when submitting your child's enrolment form, it is necessary to bring your child's Birth Certificate or identity documents, copies of family law or other relevant court orders, your child's immunisation history statement and proof of residence. 
MESSAGE FROM THE DEPUTY PRINCIPAL


Regular School Attendance

Time away from school adds up quickly. If a student has an attendance rate of 90%, then this equates to one full day absent a fortnight. Over a year this equates to 20 days absent from school, this is 4 weeks lost learning time.

We understand that in some cases illness and family emergencies happen. It is our aim as a school and system that our students are attending 90% or more of the time. Each fortnight, we will provide an update on student attendance so as a community we can aim high, with a focus on attendance and keeping on track.


As of this term, 70% (476) of our students are attending 90% or more of the time. Let's see if we can increase this percentage of students each fortnight. Please keep explaining absences and helping children arrive on time. "We are learners when we get to school on time!"

Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)



An Australian Government Initiative

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about supports provided to students with disability. These relate to legislative requirements under the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the *NCCD guidelines* (2019).

Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes:

- year of schooling
- category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional
- level of adjustment provided: support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary, substantial or extensive.

This information assists schools to:

- formally recognise the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools
- consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools
- develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational outcomes for students with disability.

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability.

The NCCD will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process. The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified – the privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured. All information is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information. To find out more about

Celebrating NAIDOC WEEK!

What an exciting way to kick off Term 3!

Teachers and students were able to immerse themselves into Aboriginal Cultural throughout the whole first week. On Wednesday 19th July we celebrated in style by holding a whole day cultural incursion. Students moved through a variety of different activities that taught them about different aspects of Aboriginal Culture such as:

- Aboriginal sweeping ceremony to begin our day and our Aboriginal students being painted up in ochre
- Indigenous sporting games

- Artefacts and weapons
- Bush Tucker
- Face Painted with symbol for water or mountain
- Aboriginal Symbols and their meanings
- Aboriginal Dance taught by one of our Aboriginal parents
- All students and teachers contributed to a whole school Mural that will be displayed at the school.

We asked some students what they learnt or enjoyed most about the day, here are some of the responses:

"My favourite activity was the Ochre face paint activity because of the beautiful designs and symbols. I also liked it because when waiting we got to read a beautiful dreamtime story in the sun." *Aaral Patel*

"Last Wednesday, year 6 settled down in the school hall for a terrific display of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander tools, such as stone axes and boomerangs. Soon after, we moved outside and classes took turns participating in Aboriginal dot painting on the whole school mural. It was fantastic and highly educational!" *Anika 6D*

"I liked the bush tucker rotation because it was very educational and fun. I also liked learning about the tools and materials that Aboriginals used to get through their daily life. I loved the dreamtime stories and creating the giant mural. All of it was amazing!" *Abby 5E*

"My favourite activity the bush tucker. We learnt about different types of bush tucker and even got to design our own gardens! I loved this since I would like to see a Bush Tucker Garden in my time at this school." *Lucas Abrahams*

"I really enjoyed the Aboriginal dancing with Lavani's mum, it was something different and new to me! The Aboriginal sporting games were also very fun and exciting!" Indy 4M

"I learnt about the Aboriginal language, my favourite activity is the Aboriginal games." $\mathcal{3M}$




